

What You Might Have Missed



Vitiligo is generally classified according to the extent, type and distribution of the lesions, ranging from focal vitiligo to segmental, inflammatory and generalized vitiligo, and finally to universal vitiligo. Segmental vitiligo is exceptional because of its asymmetric distribution and ...

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Dermatologists can offer a person many treatment options for vitiligo if they would like to treat it. Laser treatment is one such option; it uses light to restore the lost color of skin. A person should consider all the pros and cons with their dermatologist before commencing treatment.

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Though hereditary factors are implicated in the pathogenesis of vitiligo, it is unknown whether precipitating, stressful events play a role in vitiligo. To understand this, we utilized a validated perceived stress scale (PSS) to measure this parameter in vitiligo patients compared to persons without vitiligo

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
